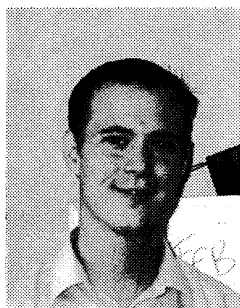


PEOPLE AND THE LAW

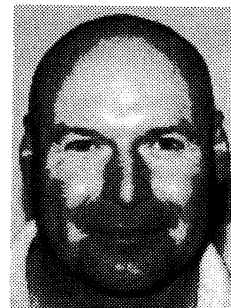
