However, as the information professions converge, so too must the issues of concern in the various information sectors and thus the published literature. AARL is a research journal for all aspects of librarianship and related fields. We hope to receive paper submissions from authors researching across the full range of information professions. AARL can then become a showcase for information-related research activity in, about, and relevant to Australia and our region.

Editing a special issue:

We encourage expressions of interest for guest editing a special issue of the Journal. Special issues may address any theme that is likely to be of interest to the Journal's readership. Guest editors may be individuals or teams and their special issue will be subject to the normal peer review process. The selection of papers and coordination of review activities will be the responsibility of the guest editors. Papers may be selected either on the basis of invitation or via a general 'call for papers'. Please contact us as soon as possible if you are interested in guest editing an issue of AARL in 2013 or 2014, so we can build it into the publication schedule.
